
Tik/Tok

Just Keep Moving

As with all apps, check their suitability for your child before they use it. Think about if it is appropriately aged for your child. How does the app use your data and does it have any communication channels within it for example?

Social Media

There are several different social media platforms that your child might be on or wanting to join such as Instagram and Snapchat. Social Media platforms are used to share pictures and communicate with others. It is important to review each individual platform to see what age your child should be to access them and to set appropriate privacy settings. It is also im-



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portant to talk to your child about information they should keep private.

Being Online



If your child is online (for example playing games, using Snapchat, Instagram etc), then it's important that we talk to our child about **being kind online,** for example only posting positive comments,

don't say anything they wouldn't say in real life and treat others as they would expect to be treated.

Your child also needs to be aware that what they see online isn't always the full picture. People only share what they want you to see and images are often filtered. It is also important that your child knows how to block and report any inappropriate behaviour when they see it.
